And lo, the whole number at the end of the third year was 70. Now this, the fourth year in the history of this great prodigious class of 1959-60, has been one of much hard labor; but little resisting by the wayside; for preparations were being made ready for the final departure from school. So far many activities were sponsored as the crowning of Otis Coats for the King of Union High.

The basketball team was not complete without the ardent zeal of James Taylor and Benjamin Lewis. There were other activities, however, we will not be able to mention.

Now the curtains are slowly closing, and this means a great deal to us, for we shall always be trying to reach the top, but we must still remember like the poet says, "Heaven is not reached by a single bound, but we build the ladder by which we rise, from the lowly earth to the vaulted skies, and mount each summit round by round."

CLASS PROPHECY

NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION, 1970 Los Angeles, California

From far and near we had gathered for this grand and glorious occasion the nomination of President and Vice-President of the United States of America. On leaving the lobby of the hotel, I entered the B & C Beauty College where I discovered that the owners were my old friends Helen Carter and Louise Baylor who informed me that preparations for the convention had kept them busy. Next door to this lovely building was a unique auto service shop operated by James Chandler, Carlton Dudley and Leroy Jones. After a brief chat, I rented a car from Floyd Scott, who seemed to be doing well for himself from the business that I saw there.

On arriving at the convention hall, I said "hello" to Virginia Smith, social studies teacher at UCLA. She informed me that Joe Taylor was the basketball coach there. Virginia Baylor was registering the delegates, assisted by Bessie and Mary Carter, and Fannie Holmes. Otis Coatrs was busy handing out "I like Bryant buttons" that he designed in his studio in New York. Theodore James, campaign manager for Rachel Bryant, was trying to persuade the North Carolina delegation to get on the "Bryant Band Wagon". Rachel, a native Virginian, was sure to give her fellow party members a light for the nomination for the presidency. Emily Childs was proof-reading and putting the finishing touches on the speech of the candidate for Vice-President, Kenneth Ragland. As expected, I saw many other Virginians who had made the trip across the continent to take part in this spectacular democratic ordeal.

After morning session, I met Eugene Minor, Rogers Mines and John Monte at a restaurant. Robert Jones and Warren Woolfolk were owners of this fabulous place. Our filet mignon was prepared by the chefs, Lucille Samuels and Girlene Ware. The dinner was served by my old classmates, Catherine Giles and Thelma Lindsey.

After lunch, I decided to drive over to Denos' to attend the Variety Show. Cosmetologists Earlene Coleman and Dorothy Lindsey were busy putting make-up on actress Patricia Williams, star of the movie "Mooncalf Mugford." Mrs. Dungee, her dramatic teacher at Union, gave a quaint smile as she chatted with her friends about the '60's at Union. Just to the right of the stage, I could see Barber Emmett Childs giving actor Benjamin Lewis a baircut. Ethel Christopher was busy making last minute preparations fitting the gowns on Irene Fields and Mable Fortune, models from Bonwit Teller's Fashion Shop in New York City. I had just glasted over the program when I noticed Jerome Terrell, a cab driver for the Yellow Cab Company, helping Dr. Alice Bock, who had just returned from Europe.

At last the show was under way, and the Mistresses of Ceremonies for the grand affair were Clara Smith and Yvonne Thomas. The opening selection was given by the California Choral Ensemble. Singing with this group were Gladys Jones, Clara Derricotte, Laura Frieman and Laura Johnson. Things really were pepped up when Ryland Jackson, John Pollard, Christine Baker, and Anne Roye commenced with the latest dance, "the space walk." Laughs were frequent while Irene Anderson and Brancis Fortune were portraying actresses Dinah Shore and Lena Horne. Lights were operated by Earle Minor, Frank Coleman and James Lindsey while Shirley Samuels and Lewis Williams waltzed very gracefully across the floor. A ballet duet was performed by Myrtle Freeman and Marie Boone. The program was concluded with a comedy routine by Herland Baker.

On my way back to Convention Hall, I saw James Minor, a clerk at the treasury department talking to his wife during coffee break. The remaining days of the convention were filled with the usual excitement and color that you would expect. It wasn't, however, until the very last day that I was stopped at the airport by Priscilla Fairchilds, who was returning to her school in northern California. Although the convention is over and all my friends have gone, never shall I forget this convention and the Decade that changed our lives and ideas.

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
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
